Key Words



- Cut up the words or make a set of flashcards. Child reads each word.
- Speedy Read how many words can they read in 30 seconds?
- Turn the flashcards over. Child chooses a word and reads it. How many can they get correct?
- Turn the flashcards over. Child chooses a word, reads the word and then says the word in a **sentence**.
- Turn the flashcards over. Child chooses 2 / 3 / 4 words.
 Can they create a sentence that includes all of the words?
- Missing word. Show child 5 words. Child closes eyes.
 Remove one word. Can child identify the missing word?
- Cut up 2 sets of the words and play **SNAP**.
- Use 2 sets of words. Turn them over and play **PAIRS**.

Reading Games



Here are some examples of simple games that you can play with your child at home to help develop their reading.

- Roll a DICE and find and <u>read</u> a word with the corresponding number of letters in your book.
- Word hunt Choose a common word e.g. the / went / was / they. See how many you can find in your book.
- Words within words. Give your child a long word e.g. hippopotamus. How many smaller words can you make using some of the letters?
- Play SNAP with tricky words from your book.
 Write down a few tricky words (twice) on scraps of paper. Play Snap read the word that is turned over.
- Use the tricky word flashcards. Turn them over and play PAIRS.
- **Reading Detectives.** Try to find and read a word beginning with each letter of the alphabet.
 - Find and read a noun / adjective / verb in your book.
